Stimulus Questions/Ideas

TIME MANAGEMENT:

- Consider how your school educates students out of the 'Primary school mindset' –
 how do students at your school learn that secondary school has different
 expectations?
- Ensure your school (or class) has clear and realistic guidelines about how much work is expected and that students (and teachers) know these expectations.
- Ensure your classes are clear on what they should work on for your subject if they have no homework (maybe put together a sheet with ideas).
- Consider a school-wide or faculty approach to a homework policy. How often should teachers check homework? What if students don't do the work, what are the consequences for homework not done?

PLANNING:

How well does your department:

- Model chunking down assignments, then gradually withdraw the level of support to a scaffold?
- Provide opportunities for class and peer sharing during the course of the assignment?

- Audit or self-audit for the required skills for the task?
- Provide feedback during the 'Reseach' phase?
- Provide feedback during the 'Execution' phase?
- Provide feedback during the 'Presentation' phase?
- Systematise the integration of the feedback process into the assessment task?
- Assess the quality and effectiveness of the feedback given?

STUDY TECHNIQUES:

- Do you know how your students study? Is there discussion around approaches before a test or exam?
- What do individual teachers do? What strategies have they taught to their classes?
- Does your faculty as a whole teach students how to study and revise effectively?
- You may like to look at some of the techniques on Page 15 and 16.

STUDY NOTES:

Imagine a school where:

- All teachers modelled or scaffolded making notes for their subject.
- All teachers set making notes as homework or assignments.
- Teachers kept examples of notes to share with students.
- Students were rewarded for making notes (bonus marks).
- Students were accountable for having notes done by certain times.
- Students had the opportunity to see other students' notes.
- Students received feedback on their notes at test time.
- Students worked collaboratively to create notes.
- Students became proficient at giving feedback on each other's notes.
